First up was our own Bob Moore, who presented a method to operate our layouts by timetable, without a fast clock. This method is based on "smiles" (scale miles around your pike for your scale) and prototypically correct speeds. Bob made it sound simple, but I don't think I could do it justice here, so I'll encourage you to talk with Bob if you want to understand it more thoroughly. (And don't miss the next meet!)

The second clinic was a scenery clinic by Jim O'Connell. Jim is a widely published author in the Z scale world, and has some very interesting techniques for creating scenery in any scale. The thing I came away from this clinic with was, not to quit if the scenery doesn't look the way you envisioned it. Keep at it until you get it the way you want. If I can accomplish half of what Don has done, I will consider my term a success! I'm very happy that Don has agreed to continue his association with the PSR Board by accepting the position of Convention Coordinator. Don may be taking on additional responsibilities, so stay tuned!

The past quarter has been a busy one for me. Our summer meet, although missing the layouts we had hoped for, was nonetheless enjoyable, with two great clinics. We also got to meet a few Z scalers who reside in the area, and we hope we see more of them. One of them, Jim O'Connell, gave an amazing scenery clinic. We also had three great layout visits. Ray Inbody's O scale layout was an example of what can be done in a relatively short time, when you put your mind to it. Duncan McRee's HO scale layout showed how you can find space for your layout by sharing space assigned to other uses. Both layouts exhibited high quality craftsmanship. Jack Byers' layout gave us an opportunity to see the beginnings of what will be a great HO scale railroad in a stand-alone building. Jack got some great suggestions from some of our more experienced folks, and the rest of us got ideas we can put to work on our own railroads.

Non-divisional activities included two trips to the San Bernardino AT&SF depot, which is amazing in and of itself. There's a small museum inside, and the BNSF mainline and intermodal yard right outside. In August the event was a Free-Mo set-up, with both HO and N scale layouts, then in September, it was the Western Prototype Modelers' (WPM) meet, which also featured both HO and N scale Free-Mo layouts. Both events were interesting to me personally, as I and other members of my club are considering construction of several modules built to Free-Mo standards. The modeling that was on display at the WPM was astounding. I'd like to get some of these guys to bring their models around to one of our quarterly meets, so you can all see the work that's being done. Also in September was the bi-annual swap meet at the Orange Empire Railway Museum. I was unable to attend this year, but some guys found some bargains, as usual. The Chula Vista Live Steamers held their annual meet over the Labor Day weekend, and the local S-Gaugers had a modular display at the San Diego Model Railroad Museum.

October included the Division layout tour, the swap meet at the San Diego Model Railroad Museum (SDMRRM), the annual Train Song Festival at Old Poway Park, and the Cajon Division meet in Barstow. It's a good thing for me that my wife works Saturdays, so I have time to participate in all these events.

We have some great events coming up that will keep us busy in the next quarter also. The Fall Meet will be at the Model Railroad Museum November 14. December has the GTE twice, first in Ontario the fifth and sixth, then here in Del Mar the 12th and 13th. December 12 is the Division Layout Tour and Holiday Party at Don & Kim Fowler's, and Christmas in Old Poway Park where Poway Station will set up their new N scale modules near the new train station. In January the Division layout tour will be at Ron Tindall's Yosemite Sugar Pine Railroad. If you haven't seen this small, but highly detailed and action-packed layout, you're in for a treat.

Sadly, the Division has lost two members in recent months who both had made significant contributions to the Division over the years. Ed Hatch, the long term Achievement Program chair, passed in August. Sam Dale, a key person on the Mission Possible 2002 convention committee, passed in September. Our Fall Meet at the SDMRRM will feature a clinic about planning for the disposition of our railroads when we go to the Great Depot in the Sky. This clinic will provide tips on how to prepare for the inevitable. I encourage all of you to attend, and drag along all your model railroading buddies, kicking and screaming if necessary. This will be important information for all of us. We'll also have a Chinese Auction to lighten the mood, as well as the usual pot luck lunch, and visits to the museum layouts. Enter by the back door. 
## Layout Tour Summary

We've had the good fortune in the last quarter to see three layouts that haven't been on the tour before,

and each was interesting in its own right. Two scales were represented, with very different approaches to designing and building a layout.

In August we visited Ray Inbody's O scale layout. Ray's layout is from the steam era up to about 1957. The primary roads we saw were the AT&SF and UP, with most of the motive power being diesel. The layout is point to point, and designed for operation. There are two main yards and some industrial switching areas, representing the route from Vernon, CA to San

Pedro, CA. The layout is housed in a stand alone 10'x 20' building. Ray has been building the layout for only about 2 ½ years, but in that time he has developed a highly-detailed, good-looking railroad that is fun to operate.

September found us visiting Duncan McRee's HO Southern Pacific layout, coincidently only a few blocks from Ray. Duncan has created a series of vignettes as the railroad travels from the master bedroom through

the walls into two adjoining bedrooms. The shelf layout uses the space above the dressers and beds. Still in progress, several of the scenes are nearing completion. The mountain section was my particular favorite, but there are also engine service facilities with a reefer icing dock, and a small waterfront. Trains run smoothly through the layout, which features servo-powered turnouts of Duncan's own design.


In October we made the trek north to Escondido to visit Jack Byers' B&O West End layout. This HO layout is housed in its own 12 x 42 foot building that includes a workshop at one end. A four-loop helix anchors the around-the-walls track plan, with a center peninsula that will be the site of the town of Grafton, WV. Grafton included a major engine servicing terminal during the steam era, and Jack intends to reproduce this. Jack is in the early stages of construction, but the potential is there for a great layout. We'll be sure to check Jack's progress from time to time.

#### Breaking out of the same old loop.

This is the first of a series of articles on operations that will run leading up to the 2010 convention. Ed

You've finally finished your dream layout. You've laid the last track, finished the scenery, and installed the last buildings and detail parts. Trains are running, but where are they running to? Is there an origin? Is there a destination? Why are the trains running? HOW are they running (what are the operating rules)?

These are some of the questions many of us have been asking ourselves over the past several years. Once the fun things, building and preparing, have been completed, is there more that the trains can do than simply go around and around that same old loop? Maybe you're a person who likes to sit back and just watch the trains go around and around, and if you do, that's fine. I'm the kind of person who gets bored with that after a time, and if you are too, maybe you should consider getting involved with one of the local operating layouts.

A group of us get together fairly regularly to operate a layout, just the way a real railroad does. We make up and break up trains, take them out "on the road" to make pick-ups and set-outs, all while following realistic railroad practices. You can use your own equipment on some lines (after approval by the layout owner – your equipment must be "up to snuff"), or use the equipment that "lives there." Operating layouts include examples from N scale up through garden size (#1 scale - 1:32). Sizes run from 4x8 with a drop-leaf extension through club-sized. These layouts are all over the county, so there's bound to be one near you.

Real railroads have a purpose: transportation of goods and people from place to place. Since we're modeling railroads, perhaps we should be modeling what they DO, as well as what they ARE. There are presently at least seven layouts in San Diego County, public and private, that host regular operating sessions

where freight and (scale) people are moved from one point to another, just like on the real thing. These layouts run the gamut from very basic operating rules to full Timetable and Train Order sessions using an actual day from the Southern Pacific Railroad. At least one layout has multiple operating sessions each week, but most are monthly, and one is about twice a year.

There are Special Interest Groups (SIGs) that can help you solve the "endless loop" problem, if it exists on your layout. Three primary SIGs that can help you overcome this problem are the Operations SIG (OPSIG), the Layout Design SIG (LDSIG), and the Digital Command Control SIG (DCCSIG). Let's look at these SIGs in a little more detail.

In our dedicated group of operators here in San Diego, many

are members of the OPSIG. The OPSIG's purpose, as stated on their web page (<u>http://opsig.org/</u>), is "...to discuss, develop and disseminate ways of operating model railroads to realistically emulate practices of the prototype railroads." These folks know all the tricks for condensing real railroad operations into your miniature world, such as loads in/empties out arrangements.

Another SIG that applies to operations is the Layout Design SIG (LDSIG). As you would expect, this group's objective (according to their web page, <u>http://ldsig.org/</u>) is "...to further the art and science of model railroad track planning and model train layout design." This group will help you design a layout (or modify an existing one) to provide realistic and interesting operations. Perhaps you want to operate realistically, but also want to provide for continuous running for open houses. They'll help you design a layout that will do that.

The thing that has really opened up operational potential on model railroads is Digital Command Control (DCC). This is the power control system that allows two locomotives to run in opposite directions on the same track, thus enabling "meets" (hopefully, not cornfield), saw-bys, and other prototypical railroad practices. Sound, included with many DCC installations and available in others, enhances the feel of the operating session by allowing the operator to use the same whistle signals that would be used by a real engineer in a given situation. One local steam-era layout even requires the engineer to stop for water at a certain place, and the water tank is complete

with lowering water spout and appropriate gurgling noises as the tender's tank is filled. DCC can be used to control turnout motors as well, providing route selection with a single throw of a switch. The DCCSIG (web page: <u>http://jdb.psu.edu/nmra/dccsig.html</u>) will help you with all of this. (*There are also other on-line discussion groups that deal with DCC. Yahoo and Litchfield Station are two that come to mind. Ed.*)

These SIGs have reasonable membership fees, and provide periodic newsletters. They have various resources for members, including a reference list and design critique services. You can get a lot out of membership in one of these groups, but you don't have to belong to them to do operations. There is a lot of local expertise, and everyone I've met in this group is more than willing to offer advice and constructive criticism, or just camaraderie.

Those of us who participate on the local operating crews get a lot of enjoyment from our involvement. We get to runs trains, sometimes our own, on some great layouts. We meet a bunch of folks who are interested in the same things we are. The social

interchange with other crew members can be very educational, as well. If you think you might be interested in joining this group, contact the editor, and he'll hook you up. Also, we're always looking for new layouts to operate, so if you think your layout is ready for operations, or if you might be able to use some help to get it ready, let us know. Finally, if you have an operations story you'd like to tell, there's always room to share here in *The Mail Hook*.



#### Sugar Beet Loader by Don Ham

The sugar beet dump and loader is modeled after a typical sugar beet loader located in the central California area. I used an article in Model Railroad Craftsman Magazine by John R. Signor, November 2008, Page 58 as a reference. I am modeling the central California coast, the hub of sugar beet industry, and this

model will fit well on my layout. This platform is an older and well used unit.

The model is 95% scratch built with some commercial parts, including door and window castings, Central Valley lattice girder bridge beams, Central Valley stairs and modified girder bridge sides. Deck planking, hand rails, electrical service, stairs and ladders, overhead lights, loader conveyor, window and doors in equipment shack, A-frame crane, beet hopper, pivoting loading chute, and waste hopper are all scratch-built. The over head lights on the loading



platform and the loading hopper have grain of rice bulbs that are wired and functional.

I laid out all assembles on graph paper and used the drawings to cut, fit and assemble the different structures. My model built in styrene and bass wood. I constructed it in three sections: the dump hopper, the conveyor, and the loading platform tower. I used .040" styrene for the concrete base and to mount the different assemblies on. The hopper is made from modified N scale girder bridge sides and styrene sheet stock. The base is channel with bass wood strips for the decking. The A-frame lift for dumping the beet delivery trucks is made of stock styrene shapes. The conveyor is made of sheet and strip shapes of styrene with Central Valley lattice girder bridge strips for the sides. The cat walk is made of bass wood planking and strips for the hand railing. The loading platform is made up of styrene and bass wood. The equipment shack is made of sheet and strip wood with the roof made of craft paper painted grimy black. The waste hopper is made of sheet and shaped styrene.

I air brushed the base with Folquil concrete and the structure with Folquil used concrete. The roof is grimy black. I also used old silver, and insignia green for details. I weathered with water color washes and powdered chalk. Signs are a mixture of decals and computer-generated.

Joel's layout is a rendition of the Rio Grande Southern in 1939, in Sn3. Portions of the Northern division are modeled. It is housed in its own dedicated climate controlled building with a layout size of 32x33. It was completed in 2000 but detail work continues as well as an up-grade to DCC control. Ship-it is used to schedule both a Northbound and a Southbound train as well as to track cars controlling loads and empties including loading/unloading times. The Yosemite Sugar Pine Railroad is modeled on the Yosemite Valley Railroad in Northern California. The YV ran from Merced to El Portal. Merced has recently been completed on the Yosemite Sugar Pine. The YSP can keep four crews busy during an operating session, even though it is basically a 4x8 railroad with additions! But then, the Gorre & Daphetid was originally 4x6. Don't miss this one!

It is 1955. The South Fork RR still uses steam locomotives, but a second-hand 44-ton diesel works the mines at Gold Hill. The South Fork interchanges with the Southern Pacific, and with the Virginia & Truckee RR in Minden, NV. Other branches serve gold mines and agricultural industries. A logging line uses a Shay to haul logs to a sawmill at Sierra City. The South Fork has an unusual track plan featuring long runs. Of note, the South Fork features buildings built by Lise, who has added highly detailed, scratchbuilt interiors to many of them. Come watch some classic short line railroading: small steam locomotives hauling short trains up steep grades to the towns and mines of the region it serves.
