The convention began with the annual Board of Directors meeting, where a new Manual of Operations was approved. This manual contains the operating procedures for the Region. Having these procedures in a document separate from the Bylaws simplifies on-going administration of the Region.

Wednesday evening the San Diego Model Railroad Museum (SDMRM) hosted a reception, during which the San Diego Society Of N Scalers (SD SONS) held an operating session on their Pacific Desert Lines. They had quite a crowd of happy model railroaders. At the same time, the La Mesa Model Railroad Club displayed their improvements on the Tehachapi Pass exhibit. Parts of this exhibit are still under construction, but it was interesting to see the progress they're making. The San Diego 3-Railers had their Lionel-sized trains running, much to everyone's delight, and the San Diego Model Railroad Club had their San Diego & Arizona Eastern open. Preparing for the Inevitable, or How to Make It Easier on Your Heirs

As Hank Williams sang, "No matter how you struggle and strive, you'll never get out of this world alive." That was proved true over the past couple of months, as we lost two good friends, Bob Moore and Bill Gordon. The passing of these modelers brings to mind the passing of some other model railroaders I've known, and there are some lessons for all of us in these experiences. No one likes to contemplate their mortality, but neither can we escape it. Taking some time to organize our thoughts on the disposition of our model railroad will make it easier on whomever has to handle our affairs once we've passed.

Probably the biggest thing we tend to lose track of is that our heirs will most likely have little or no idea what to do with everything. It may be our pride and joy, but it may be a burden to those left behind. Here are a few ideas we can use to make it easier to them to know what to do with all our "stuff."

Remember that our heirs are most likely not model railroaders. As such, they have no idea of the value of things. To them, that unbuilt FSM kit is worth the same as the Model Power kit next to it. Likewise that OMI brass Hudson looks the same to them as the AHM plastic Hudson. Each of us should take some time to make an inventory of our trains, and indicate which things are more valuable.

Discuss our wishes with our executors or trust adminstrators so they know what we want done with our trains. You may have some specific bequests of some special items. Perhaps you'll donate the rest to one of the many model railroad organizations in the area.

Enlist the help and support of some close model railroad friends. Make a pact for the survivors to help your heirs dispose of your empire. This may involve listing something on ebay or Craig's List for disposal, or simply helping our heirs pack up our things for moving to their home. In return for their help. offer something of value from our collection. Be sure your heirs know of this arrangement. And, don't forget to augment the group continually with new members, so we're not "the last man standing."

Many local clubs will assist with dismantling our layouts carefully, so special buildings can be salvaged. Consider making a donation to them in exchange. This could be cash, or something from our collection.

The key to all this is to take some time to organize our collection and record our wishes. Make sure someone knows what they are. If you have a trust, record your instructions there for your trust administrator. Our heirs will have plenty on their minds after we pass. Let's not make it harder on them than it has to be. A little preplanning will go a long way to simplify their lives. I hope none of us needs this advice any time soon, but don't procrastinate. You never know when your train will be called.

Scanning of the KML photos begins

If you're a subscriber to *NMRA Magazine* (formerly *Scale Rails*) you've seen the "Timeframes" series of photographs printed on the magazine's last page. Those are all shots taken from the Kalmbach Memorial Library (KML) archives. The fact is, our NMRA Library has over 100,000 images, negatives, slides, plans and drawings, and only a handful have ever been seen by NMRA members



because it would have entailed making a personal trip to Headquarters in Chattanooga, Tennessee, to flip through the files.

Soon that will all change, thanks to the NMRA's Diamond Club. The Diamond Club is a fundraiser specifically designed to support adding enhanced content to our website at www.nmra.org. The first item on the list of is scanning those 100,000 images and making them available for download.

The good news is that scanning of the photographs has begun! In August of 2010, Historical Archives Services (HAS), the firm the NMRA Board of Directors hired to do the scans and design the photo website, began receiving and cataloging shipments of photographs from KML. HAS estimates that the first batch of photographs will be available for viewing online sometime in the first quarter of 2011, after a short period of beta testing late this year.

Putting the entire library online will be a costly, time consuming task, since each photo's listing will also contain highly detailed, searchable metadata, which is being added by the railroad experts at HAS. This detailed metadata will make it easier and faster for users to find exactly the photograph they're looking for. Current plans are to make the low-resolution thumbnails of the photographs available to everyone via the website around the clock. Users will be able to download high-resolution files, and NMRA members will receive a substantial discount. Proceeds from the scans will help fund the remainder of the project and future Diamond Club web projects.

As promising as this sounds, it's important to remember that the Diamond Club still hasn't reached its projected goal of \$75,000. 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Large Scale Coupler Technical Report Published

The NMRA Large Scale Coupler Study Group has updated its report as of June 15, 2010, and proposed a Recommended Practice aimed at encouraging manufacturers to produce couplers that are compatible with those of other manufacturers. This report is available on the NMRA web page, www.NMRA.org, from the Standards & Conformance link on the home page. Steve Siedensticker of the San Diego Division has been instrumental in creating this body of work. Thanks, Steve.

Revised Standard 7, Clearances, Proposed

For years the NMRA standards gage has been based on the Plate C clearance. Those of us running double-stacks and autoracks know this gage provides inadequate clearance for these cars. Plate H has been used by the American Railway Engineering and Maintenance-of-Way Association (AREMA) to establish clearances since 1983. The NMRA has recognized the need to update its gage, and proposed this modification to Standard 7. The draft revision proposes three separate clearances for old-time, classic, and modern periods. LAYOUT TOURS

December (12th) Layout Tour 2010

Don Fowler - Southern Pacific in multiple scales

Our N scale railroad measures 16x20' and models the Southern Pacific from 1975-1995 from West Colton California to Colfax, California, with stops in Mojave and Roseville. The system includes operating signals, grade crossings, night lighting, scale track, and a hot box detector. We are currently transitioning to DCC but can also accommodate DC operation.

The G scale Southern Pacific railroad has a 400' mainline and runs around the perimeter of the backyard. Features include a tunnel, bridges, waterfalls, engine facility, 5 track storage yard, and operating signals. There are two small Z scale Southern Pacific layouts and a small O-27 scale Southern Pacific layout as well.

January (8th) Layout Tour

Dick Roberts - Nevada County Railroad in HO Scale

The Nevada County Railroad is an HO scale standard gauge layout based on the Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad. The layout follows the NCNGRR mainline from the interchange with the Southern Pacific at Colfax, California, through Grass Valley to Nevada City. It is set in the 1920's era. This layout is a mushroom design in a 21 x 23 fot room that takes advantage of almost every cubic foot of space. The aisles climb to follow the 164 feet of mainline and as you follow your train with the DCC controller you pass the scratch-built structures and excellent scenery. The most unique feature of the layout is the elevator that carries the train vertically from one level to another. The layout was featured in the Sep/Oct 2006 issue of *Narrow Gauge and Short Line Gazette*.

March (12th) Layout Tour

Nelson Rath - Western-themed O Scale

Nelson has a special 38 x 16 foot building for his O scale empire, The railroad depicts a western setting and runs just about everything west of the Big River. UP, SP, D&RGW, GN, WP, and more. This is no brokendown class III branch line! Nelson runs the big stuff. We are talking huge Hudsons, Challengers, Turbines, and the Grand Daddy of them all... the UP Big Boys. In O scale you can imagine the pulling power and the awesome sound of the long consists of hoppers or reefers thundering down the track.

We have had a busy month at Short Track Railroad. A lot of planning went into our participation in the PSR "Clear to San Diego". We had an op session, an open house, and member's home layouts open for visitors. Many of our members were involved in the organization of the convention itself. We had quite a few contest entries and some wins. In addition, some club members gave clinics at the Handlery hotel.

We participated in the annual Fall Tractor Show at our museum. All our layouts were up and running. The show ran October 16 and 17 and October 23 and 24. The next Tractor Show will be in June 2011. There is an admission charge. More details can be found at www.agsem.com


Our regular op sessions on the second Thursday of the month continue to be popular with members and visitors. Sessions are getting better and better as we gain experience with the software, and upgrade the layout. Anyone interested is encouraged to show up at 7:00 PM.

We are continuing construction on our Donner Pass layout. The latest piece of engineering is The Butte Canyon Bridge (BCB - near the town of Cisco). It is made of ABS plastic that was cut on our industrial laser. The piers were made of plaster from molds we created just for this project. It was a challenge because the real bridge started as a single-track structure. The second track was put in years later. This meant 2 different materials for the piers, the first being cut stone and the second being concrete. They are accurately represented in plaster on our project. BCB was built in a box in order to get the pier heights fixed at the proper length. When everything was correct and fit properly it was removed from the box and dropped into the layout. By constructing the bridge in a box, the installation on our layout, was completed in one morning. BCB took about 40 hours to complete, spread over a 2-month period. The bridge construction crew consisted of Tim Woodard, leader and chief construction person; Milt Perkins, drawings and plans; Paul Schmitt, painting and track work; Jim Wirt, electrical wiring, and Ray Inbody, scenery.

On a more somber note, we mourn the passing of member Bill Gordon, a long-time member of our club.

Contact information for the club in now included among the clubs and organizations listed on the back cover of the San Diego Model Railroad Museum's *San Diego Telegraph*, the quarterly newsletter. Thanks are due to John Rotsart, the museum's executive director, for making this happen. Also, the two most recent issues of *NMRA Magazine* each contained an article by an S modeler, exhibiting increased interest in our favorite scale.

Several members quickly knocked together a temporary "odd man" module for our Labor Day visit to SDMRM. We needed one more 2-foot by 4-foot straight module to balance the layout module count for the visit without leaving behind the very handsome trestle bridge module that wouldn't otherwise have had an opposite side mate.



We will build a permanent club owned odd man module. This module will have full S MOD electrical and mechanical standards compatibility, legs, and will otherwise be very similar to the temporary one in that it will have mainline trackage only, and no elaborate scenery or decorative structures. This will give the club the option to bring it along if needed when selecting which modules best fit into a particular space, and to leave it behind without regrets when its not needed. As members independently build new straight modules, the need for this flexibility is likely to increase.

The club plans to participate in this year's Great Train Expo in Del Mar. Scheduling of a show for this year had been in some doubt, but that has been resolved and the GTE is scheduled to be in Del Mar on December 4th and 5th, and SDSG plans to participate.

Next year's Extra 2011 West Convention, which will combine the NMRA and NASA annual conventions,

will held from July 3rd through July 9th 2011 in Sacramento. Several SDSG members will be attending, and there is much interest in bringing the layout to the cooperating National Train Show being held across the street from July 8th through July 10th. We have sent in a preliminary request to participate in the show and are awaiting more complete information that is expected in mid September.

Poway Station All Scale Model RR Club

Poway Station recently finished a successful display at the Train Song Festival in Old Poway Park. This year we showed our N scale modules along with some of our HO modules, and we ran a "car clinic" for the public to observe.

The N scale layout is coming along nicely. Most of the mountain contours have been established on one module, and we're ready to add rock molds, ground cover, trees, and other scenery. Pretty soon those black diamonds will be pouring out of the Leverite Mine.



For this display, some of the HO modules were set up as a switching layout along the side of the room. These are the newest modules, and offer a lot of switching action. When complete, they will also provide an access point to attach to our standard layout Free-Mo modules that some of our members are building.

The car clinic we had set up demonstrated how we check cars for proper coupler height, NMRA recommended weight, and wheel gauge. Keeping cars tuned up results in better operation. Many members of the public were intrigued to see how we do this.

Our next display will be at Christmas in the Park, December 11, 2010. This will be held at Old Poway Park from 4:30-8:30pm. In addition to our display, Santa will arrive by train, courtesy of the Poway Midland Railroad, to visit with kids in Santa's Workshop. Various Christmas crafts and carolers will be available for the kids. Bring the whole family out.
